Privacy Policy

Rationale

The College is bound by the Australian Privacy Principles (APPs) contained in the Commonwealth *Privacy Act 1988*. In relation to health records, the College is also bound by the *Health Records Act 2001* (Vic.) and the Health Privacy Principles in that Act.

The College may, from time to time, review and update this Privacy Policy to take account of new laws and technology, changes to the College's operations and practices and to make sure it remains appropriate to the changing College environment.

Aim of the Policy

Provide information on how the College manages personal information provided to, or collected by it, in accordance with Commonwealth legislation.

Policy Statement

All staff of the College have a responsibility to maintain the highest level of integrity in their dealings with all members of the De La Salle Community, demonstrating their firm commitment to protecting personal privacy. The College has a duty to respect the confidentiality of individuals in all data collected.

Guidelines

What kinds of personal information does the College collect and how does the College collect it?

The College collects and holds personal information, including health and other sensitive information, about:

- students and parents and/or guardians ('Parents') before, during and after the course of a student's enrolment at the College including:
 - name, contact details (including next of kin), date of birth, gender, language background, previous College and religion;
 - Parents' education, occupation and language background;
 - medical information (e.g. details of disability and/or allergies, and details of any assistance the student receives in relation to those disabilities, medical reports and annual medical plans);
 - conduct and complaint records, or other behaviour notes, College attendance and all College reports;
 - information about referrals to government welfare agencies;
 - counselling reports;
 - any court orders relevant to custody arrangements;
 - volunteering information (including Working With Children Checks);
 - photos and videos at College events.

- job applicants and staff members including:
 - name, contact details (including emergency contacts) and date of birth;
 - information on job application;
 - professional development history;
 - salary and payment information, including superannuation details;
 - medical information (e.g. details of, disability and/or allergies and medical certificates);
 - complaint records and investigation reports;
 - leave details;
 - photos and videos at College events;
 - work emails and private emails (when using work email address) and internet browsing history.
- other people who come into contact with the College, including name and contact details and any other information necessary for the particular contact with the College.

Personal Information you provide: The College will generally collect personal information held about an individual by way of forms filled out by parents or students, face-to-face meetings and interviews, emails and telephone calls. On occasions, people other than parents and students (i.e. job applicants) provide personal information to the College.

Personal Information provided by other people: In some circumstances the College may be provided with personal information about an individual from a third party, for example a report provided by a medical professional or a reference from another College. The type of information the College may collect from another College may include:

- academic records and/or achievement levels
- medical information that may be relevant in assisting De La Salle College to provide for student and staff wellbeing

Exception in relation to employee records: Under the *Privacy Act*, the Australian Privacy Principles do not apply to an employee record. As a result, this Privacy Policy does not apply to the College's treatment of an employee record where the treatment is directly related to a current or former employment relationship between the College and employee. The College handles staff health records in accordance with the Health Privacy Principles in the *Health Records Act 2001 (Vic.)*.

Anonymity: The College needs to be able to identify individuals with whom it interacts and to collect identifiable information about them to facilitate the delivery of schooling to its students and its educational and support services, conduct the job application process and fulfil other obligations and processes. However, in some limited circumstances some activities and interactions with the College may be done anonymously where practicable, which may include making an inquiry, complaint, providing feedback or participating in marketing surveys.

How will the College use the personal information you provide?

The College will use personal information it collects from you for the primary purpose attained on collection, and for such other secondary purposes that are related to the primary purpose of collection and reasonably expected by you, or to which you have consented.

Students and Parents: In relation to personal information of students and Parents, the College's primary purpose of collection is to enable the College to provide schooling to students enrolled at the College (including educational and support services for the student), exercise its duty of care and perform necessary associated administrative activities which will enable students to take part in all the activities of the College. This includes satisfying the needs of parents, the needs of the student and the needs of the College throughout the whole period the student is enrolled at the College.

The purposes for which the College uses personal information of students and parents include:

- to keep parents informed about matters related to their child's schooling, through correspondence, newsletters and magazines;
- day-to-day administration of the College;
- looking after students' educational, social and medical wellbeing;
- seeking donations and marketing for the College;
- seeking feedback from students and parents on school performance and improvement, including through school improvement surveys
- to satisfy the College's legal obligations and allow the College to discharge its duty of care; -
- to satisfy the College contractors/service providers legal obligations, including the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd (CECV) and the Catholic Education Offices.

In some cases where the College requests personal information about a student or Parent, if the information requested is not provided, the College may not be able to enrol or continue the enrolment of the student or permit the student to take part in a particular activity.

Job applicants and contractors: In relation to personal information of job applicants the College's primary purpose of collection is to assess and (if successful) to engage the applicant.

The purposes for which the College uses personal information of job applicants include:

- administering the individual's employment or contract, as the case may be;
- for insurance purposes;
- satisfying the College's legal obligations, for example, in relation to child protection legislation.

Contractors: The College engages an external provider to gather compliance information on all contractors. This provider; SAM4schools stores personal information on a cloud-based system.

Volunteers: The College also obtains personal information about volunteers who assist the College in its functions or conduct associated activities, such as Old Collegian Association events and reunions, which also includes the Mothers of Former Students (MOFS) and other Lasallian events, enabling the College and the volunteers to work together, to confirm their suitability and to manage their visits.

Counsellors: The College contracts with external providers to provide counselling services for some students. The Principal may require the Counsellor to inform him or her or other teachers of any issues the Principal and the Counsellor believe may be necessary for the College to know for the well-being or development of the student who is counselled or other students at the College.

Parish: The College may disclose limited personal information to - surrounding parishes to facilitate religious and sacramental programs.

Marketing and fundraising: It is considered marketing and seeking donations for the future growth and development of the College as an important part of ensuring that the College continues to provide a quality-learning environment in which both students and staff thrive. Personal information held by the College may be disclosed to organisations that assist in the College's fundraising, i.e. the Old Collegians Association or, on occasions, external fundraising organisations may be engaged.

Parents, staff, alumni, suppliers and other members of the wider College community may from time to time receive fundraising information. College publications, like newsletters and magazines, which include personal information and sometimes people's images, may be used for marketing purposes.

Who might the College disclose personal information to and store your information with?

The College may disclose personal information, including sensitive information, held about an individual for educational, administrative and support purposes. This may include disclosure to:

- College service providers who provide educational, support and health services to the College, (either at the College or off campus) including the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd (CECV), Catholic Education Offices, specialist visiting teachers, volunteers, counsellors, sports coaches and providers of learning and assessment tools;
- Third party service providers that provide online educational and assessment support services, services in relation to school improvement surveys, document and data management services;
- CECV and Catholic Education Offices to discharge its responsibilities under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013* (Regulation) and the *Australian Education Act 2013* (Cth) (AE Act) relating to students with a disability;
- Other third parties which the College uses to support or enhance the educational or pastoral care services for its students or to facilitate communications with parents;
- To another College including to its teachers to facilitate the transfer of a student;
- Federal and State government departments and agencies;
- Health service providers;
- Recipients of College publications, such as newsletters and magazines;
- Student's parents or guardians and their emergency contacts;
- Assessment and educational authorities including the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority;
- Anyone you authorise the College to disclose information to, this includes providing reference checks to Banks, Real Estate agents or other employers;
- Anyone who we are required or authorised to disclose the information to by law, including child protection laws.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on College Students with Disability

The College is required by the Federal *Australian Education Regulation (2013)* and *Australian Education Act 2013* (Cth) (AE Act) to collect and disclose certain information under the *Nationally Consistent Collection of Data* (NCCD) on students with a disability. The College provides the required information at an individual student level to the Catholic Education Offices and the CECV, as an approved authority. Approved authorities must comply with reporting, record keeping and data quality assurance obligations under the NCCD. Student information provided to the federal government for the purpose of the NCCD does not explicitly identify any student.

Sending and storing information overseas: The College may disclose personal information about an individual to overseas recipients, for instance, to facilitate a College exchange. However, the College will not send personal information about an individual outside Australia without:

- obtaining the consent of the individual; or
- otherwise complying with the Australian Privacy Principles or other applicable privacy legislation.

The College may from time to time use the services of third party online service providers (including for the delivery of services and third party online applications, or Apps relating to email, instant messaging and education and assessment, which may be accessible by you. Some personal information [including sensitive information] may be collected and processed or stored by these providers in connection with these services.

De La Salle College will not send personal information about an individual outside Australia without:

- your consent (in some cases this consent will be implied);
- otherwise complying with the Australia Privacy Principles or other applicable privacy legislation.

College personnel and the College's service providers, and the CECV and its service providers, may have the ability to access, monitor, use or disclose emails, communications (e.g. instant messaging), documents and associated administrative data for the purposes of administering the system and services ensuring their proper use.

The College makes reasonable efforts to be satisfied about the security of any personal information that may be collected, processed and stored outside Australia, in connection with any cloud and third party services and will endeavour to ensure the cloud is located in countries with substantially similar protections as per the Australian Privacy Principles.

Where personal and sensitive information is retained by a cloud service provider on behalf of CECV to facilitate Human Resources and staff administrative support, this information may be stored on servers located in or outside Australia.

How does the College treat sensitive information?

In referring to 'sensitive information', the College means: information relating to a person's racial or ethnic origin, political opinions, religion, trade union or other professional or trade association membership, philosophical beliefs, sexual orientation or practices or criminal record, that is also personal information; health information and biometric information about an individual.

Sensitive information will be used and disclosed only for the purpose for which it was provided or a directly related secondary purpose, unless you agree otherwise, or the use or disclosure of the sensitive information is allowed by law.

Management and security of personal information

The College's staff are required to respect the confidentiality of students' and parents' personal information and the privacy of individuals.

The College has in place steps to protect the personal information the College holds from misuse, interference and loss, unauthorised access, modification or disclosure by use of various methods including locked storage of paper records and password access rights to computerised records. This includes responding to any incidents, which may affect the security of the personal information it holds. If we assess that anyone whose information is affected by such a breach is likely to suffer serious harm as a result, we will notify them and the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner of the breach.

It is recommended that parents and the college community adopt secure practices to protect themselves. You should ensure that all passwords you use are strong and regularly updated and that your log in details are kept secure. Do not share your personal information with anyone without first verifying their identity and organisation. If you believe any of your personal information has been compromised, please let the College know immediately.

Access and correction of personal information

Under the Privacy Act and the Health Records Act, an individual has the right to seek and obtain access to any personal information and health records respectively which the College holds about them and to advise the College of any perceived inaccuracy. Students will generally be able to access and update their personal information through the Parent Portal.

There are some exceptions to the access rights set out in the applicable legislation.

To make a request to access or to update any personal information the College holds about you or your child, please contact the College Principal or the Deputy Principal – Staff and Operations by telephone or email. The College may require you to verify your identity and specify what information you require. The College may charge a fee to cover the cost of verifying your application and locating, retrieving, reviewing and copying any material requested. If the information sought is extensive, the College will advise the likely cost in advance. If we cannot provide you with access to that information, we will provide you with written notice explaining the reasons for refusal.

Consent and rights of access to the personal information of students

The College respects every Parent's right to make decisions concerning their child's education.

Generally, the College will refer any requests for consent and notices in relation to the personal information of a student to the student's Parents. The College will treat consent given by Parents as consent given on behalf of the student, and notice to Parents will act as notice given to the student.

Parents may seek access to personal information held by the College about them or their child by contacting the College Principal or the Deputy Principal – Staff and Operations by telephone or in writing. However, there may be occasions when access is denied. Such occasions would include where release of the information would have an unreasonable impact on the privacy of others, or where the release may result in a breach of the College's duty of care to the student or a breach of a known Court Order or legal agreement.

The College may, at its discretion, on the request of a student grant that student access to information held by the College about them, or allow a student to give or withhold consent to the use of their personal information, independently of their Parents. This would normally be done only when the maturity of the student and/or the student's personal circumstances warrant it.

Enquiries and Complaints
